### Through Iris' Eyes

I believe in prayers, but I especially believe in wishes and miracles. Those who really know me (family and friends that go way back) probably remember that I make wishes to the first evening star. Been doing that since I heard of "Tinker Bell"!

When I was 5 years old, my Polish Orthodox Zaide taught me this quote:

"Just as the world cannot exist without livelihood, so it cannot be without miracles and wonders."

Shocher Tov (Midrash Tehillim)

Zaide probably knew that this "quote" didn't have the depth at age 5 that it would as I continued to mature. And like him, I never forgot it, and hold it in my heart till this day.

There have been very challenging times in my life, so prayers, wishes, and miracles were how I managed to maintain. When my 42 year old son was 17, he was diagnosed with cancer and had two weeks to live. Sure, we saw a doctor immediately, who began chemo, surgery and other treatments; i.e. diet, counseling, etc. But I went into prayer, wishes, and miracles mode. To this day, I believe that my mode was at least 50% of the cure. Because without faith, how can we move forward?

And you cannot tell me that the birth of your child, grandchild, and your great-grandchild is not a miracle!

So, at this point, you probably figured out that I do not make New **Year's** resolutions. Maybe they are too pragmatic, maybe meant to be broken, which survey results often reveal. Whereas, prayers, wishes, and miracles create a sense of wonder and hope beyond **one's** self.

Where am I going with this message, you ask?

I'm about to develop a "Temple Shalom Wish List." When I was the Executive Director of a social service agency, I remember creating "Wish Lists" to encourage donors to give much needed items, as budgets were extremely limited.

The "Wish List" at Temple Shalom is a different model than government-funded entities. It's about wants and needs that can truly happen with faith and the collective mindset of wishing and envisioning miracles.

Here's my Wish List:

The First Rabbi at Temple Shalom by June 2017

Expansion, to include a roomier choir loft, office space, classrooms, and a social hall

Additional support staff; i.e., financial and administrative

A hearing loop for those who need this device

Special window shades that do not hide the beautiful stained glass but will block out the sun

New prayer books

Continued health, energy, and love in this wonderful congregation

At this point, I can hear some of the founders expressing their concern for my mental stability! But bear in mind **folks...miracles** are possible.

And I challenge all of you to develop your own "Wish List." After you do, please email me your prayers, wishes, and miracles for a brighter and better Temple Shalom.

TU B'SHEVAT (Jewish Arbor Day)

Go to Israel...plant a tree! **Or don't go to Israel ... plant a** tree there anyway! Have a Seder and feast on fruit from trees, or from the Seven Species of vegetation described in the Bible as being abundant in the land of Israel. Wish your friends and family a Happy New Year --- the New Year for trees. Or plant a tree, either in our country, or preferably in Israel. **Any of these ways to acknowledge Tu B'Shevat, the** 15<sup>th</sup> day of the Jewish month of Shevat (corresponding to Feb. 11<sup>th</sup>, 2017), is proper. **The word "Tu" is** not really a word; it is the number 15 in Hebrew ... like the 4<sup>th</sup> of July), and the significance is the "new year" for calculating the age of trees.

The history of this reverence for trees goes back to the Temple period before 70 CE, when farmers of fruit were taxed in the form of tithes. Tu **B'Shev**at was probably a day for tax collection on fruit. After the destruction of the Temple, tithing was not done, and no one knows how or if the celebrating of the age of trees was conducted. In the 17<sup>th</sup> century, Kabbalists created a ritual for the day that is similar to a Passover Seder, concentrating on the eating of the fruits of the land. **However, since the rise of Zionism and Statehood, Tu B'Shevat is** primarily associated with the planting of trees. Way back in 1913, in **Palestine, the Israel Teacher's** Association, along with 1500 students traveled to the Jewish colony of Motza, about 3 miles west of Jerusalem. The students planted trees and exchanged fruits with each other. Later, Jewish Arbor Day was adopted by the Jewish



National Fund in an effort to combat malaria in the swamplands of the Hula Valley. The JNF planted eucalyptus trees in order to drain the malaria infested areas, thus saving the lives of the Jewish pioneers. The most popular theme today is to acknowledge ethical obligations to care for the planet and its inhabitants... a time for connecting to the earth.

So, this February, it would be environmentally splendid for you to dig into your pockets, shovel some dollars from your wallet, fill out the Jewish National Fund form in *The Shalom*, and have a tree planted in Israel in your honor or that of someone you love. Some future Jewish tree huggers will be so glad that you put down roots for them. Thank "yew"! (For Larry Wallace by Charlotte Newman)

### Ed-Jew-Cation: Coffee, Tea, or ??? Coffee!!!

Ahh, there's nothing like a hot cup of coffee on a chilly Florida day. Yummy! And did you ever realize how much Jewish history went into that brew? Centuries ago Ethiopians discovered the stimulating effects of chewing the berries of native trees. (There's the cute legend of the goatherd who noticed that when the goats munched on the fruit they began frolicking happily, so the goatherd tried the berries himself. That was the first caffeine kick in history.) The Yemenites learned to roast and brew the coffee beans into a tasty beverage. Sweetener was added to the liquid because the drink was otherwise too bitter for taste, and soon coffee was all the rage, perhaps more as a substitute for forbidden alcohol in Islam. Religious Jews, like the religious Muslims in those lands, drank it to stay alert for nightly devotion, so states Israeli professor of history Elliott Horowitz. At the same time, coffee raised debate as to whether it was kosher (yes); should it be considered medicine (no), and what blessing should be said over it (a general blessing).

Most people drank the beverage hot, in coffeehouses, which first opened in Constantinople in the 1500's. In 1553 an Egyptian rabbi ruled that Jews could drink coffee prepared by a non-Jew but advised that their coffee should be "delivered home". Although his name is undocumented, it is known that it was a Jew who exported the concept of coffeehouses to Europe, first in Livorno, Italy in 1632. In 1650, a Lebanese known as "Jacob the Jew" founded the first English coffeehouse in Oxford. Recognizing a money-maker, Sephardic Jews became coffee traders and soon brought the coffeehouse to the Netherlands and France. Politically, in some countries, there was resentment of the success of coffee; Frederick the Great of Germany proclaimed "My people must drink beer", and attempted to restrict the Jewish coffee trade altogether, so as not to conflict with the growing beer industry. Apparently coffee won out.

By the 19th century, coffeehouses, or cafes, were the social centers of middle Europe, especially in Vienna and Berlin, where Jewish intellects gathered to sip coffee, socialize, and exchange ideas. On the negative side of the fad was the growth of coffee in the new world (think the West Indies and Brazil) where slaves were imported to do the hard work of planting and reaping. Since many Jews had settled in that part of the world after they were exiled from Spain and Portugal and were heavily involved in the coffee trade, it is without doubt that there were Jewish slave holders.

In America, after the Boston Tea Party, it was unpatriotic to drink tea, causing the drinking of coffee to flourish. When the Jewish immigrant tide swept in from Europe, they brought along "a little something to go along" ---coffee cake! Bakeries, mostly Jewish owned, sprang up featuring this new confection. Out in the Wild West, Jewish peddlers and tradesmen were very influential in spreading the

popularity of the drink, as evidenced by the ubiquitous tin coffee pot being used at every campfire and in every log cabin. Meanwhile, back in New York, where competition for the commodity was fierce, a Latvian immigrant named Joseph Martinson first sold his beans from a pushcart on the Lower East Side. He then opened a factory in lower Manhattan in 1898 and by the 1930's was a mogul, catering to hotels and restaurants, and packaging Martinson's Coffee in cans to sell retail. A competitor, Samuel Schonbrunn, produced the Savarin brand, which was served with distinction at the Waldorf Astoria. A later entrant to this coffee klatch was William Black, a Jew, whose nut stores morphed into Chock Full o' Nuts coffee shops. Many of these brands were bought out by larger businesses, but the Schoenholt family, owner of Gillies Coffee, and other specialty coffee manufacturers are still very much in the coffee business. And let's not forget the advertising coup of Maxwell House Coffee (not Jewish owned) and the Passover Haggadah, of which over 50 million copies have been printed, in what has been called the oldest and longest running sales promotion in advertising history. The promotion was created by a man named Jacobson of one of the first Jewish-owned advertising agencies in America.

In more recent years, the ever-present Starbucks has re-invented the coffeehouse. The company was established in 1971, by three friends, one of whom was Zev Siegl. Howard Schultz (a Brooklyn Jewish guy) acquired the company in 1997 and grew it to its present prominence. He is also responsible for the design of the easily recognized Starbucks coffee cup, which is said to start coffee lovers salivating upon its sight. (Mr. Schultz is retiring from the presidency this spring, it was announced). A Jewish **Bostonian, William Rosenberg, put the donut before the coffee when he opened his "holey" homemade** donut shop, which later became, when he introduced his own brand of coffee------ **Dunkin' Donuts!** 

Now then, as you are enjoying your coffee and dunking your donut, you might want to add a bit more sweetness to the cup. Reach for the "Sweet N Low", the sweet idea of Ben Eisenstadt and his son Marvin, who were the first to package individual portions of sugar, and who then created the saccharine based artificial sugar and its packaging. The name "Sweet N Low" came from the song "Sweet and Low", which Ben liked, and the package color pink was chosen so that it would stand out in a bowl of sweeteners. You might be served coffee in a green colored cup with Greek motif, particularly if you are in New York. Fifty years ago, to try to sell more paper cups to Greek-owned diners in NYC, the marketing director for the Sherri Cup Company created the "Anthora" coffee cup. The cup's creator was Leslie Buck (born Laszlo Buch, a survivor of both Auschwitz and Buchenwald.). "For Buck, it was a long journey from "Work Makes You Free" to "We are Happy to Serve You", which is the logo on the cup.

As for famous Jewish teas, the only newsworthy one is that of the Wissotsky Tea Company, the first tea distributor in Russia in 1849, and currently a distributor in Israel. The company produces more than 200 products (e.g. green and black teas, chais and herbal and fruit blends). Wissotsky is very popular in Israel; so much so that special machines were made for brewing tea for the soldiers while they are in their tanks. One of your favorite memories may be of your grandparents sipping hot tea (probably Swee Touch Nee – a Russian blended tea in the red treasure chest) from a saucer, with a lump of sugar between their lips. How sweet it is!


### **MOVIE COLUMN**

A TRIBUTE TO THE BLACK EXPERIENCE IN MEMORY OF MARTIN LUTHER KING JR. By SANDI NEWMARK

For once there are multiple movies of such high quality playing here that I must recommend seeing all of them as a tribute to Dr. King's memory.......the best kind of tribute. To me, viewing these fine films to understand what black people experienced (and are still experiencing) in our generation is so much more powerful than witnessing a demonstration protest, even of the nonviolent kind Dr. King recommended. One cannot see these films and not gain more insight into why there has been violence and hatred to protest the "establishment's" treatment of minorities.

FENCES is quite simply one of the finest and most dramatic films I have ever seen, and I have seen many.

From the first words star Denzel Washington speaks, as a garbage man on the back of a truck, to the very emotional ending, I was transfixed by the character he plays, a man who has been denied many chances in life to succeed, to have even a successful "ordinary" life. Throughout the film, which had been a Broadway play by August Wilson, Washington's character verbalizes so effectively what his life is and has been like, and vividly shows how all his relationships with friends and family have been affected. To say it is movingly effective is such a massive understatement: it literally blew me away.





Another film, HIDDEN FIGURES, offers dramatic revelations as well, through the eyes of three brilliant black women who helped engineer the U.S. space program for NASA in the 1960s. That they have not been given any public credit until this film speaks volumes for the racism that permeated our society since then. How they were made to grovel before white supervisors and officials is embarrassingly uncomfortable and the fact that they endured such denigration and still persevered with their projects is amazing.

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

FIRST HASIDIC WOMAN JUDGE: Rachel Freier is the first woman from ultra-Orthodox Hasidic background to be elected as a judge in the United States. She won a three-way Democratic primary and the general election to become the new Brooklyn NY civil court judge. She is 51 yrs. old, a married mother of six children who didn't start college until her 30's. She says, "This is a dream; it's the American dream." It's extremely rare for an Hasidic or other ultra-Orthodox woman to hold an elected position, even in Israel. At her swearing in, she pledged her commitment to the public, her religion, and her community. She vowed to uphold the Constitution and to illuminate the Hasidic world for her new colleagues. Good luck, Judge Rachel!

CORNERSTONE HOSPICE ACCREDITED TO OFFER JEWISH SERVICES: Only about 50 hospice centers in the nation are accredited by the National Institute for Jewish Hospice to offer Jewish services to its patients. Recently Cornerstone Hospice in The Villages had its accreditation renewed at the NIJH annual conference in November. All chaplains at the Cornerstone locations are trained and have the ability to serve Jewish patients. Spiritual Care program manager, Rich Behers, of Cornerstone Hospice of Winter Haven, travels to NJ to attend the accreditation conference and learn the basics of the Jewish faith. "It's really paying attention to the patients' quality of life, and that's what hospice is about. It gives them peace at the end of life."

### INQUIRING REPORTER: WHY ARE YOU GLAD TO BE A JEW?

This has been documented as part of our gifts to humanity, consistent with our covenant with our Creator. We must beat a soft drum and accept humility in order to discourage envy, jealousy, and prejudice. The Creator has favored us with sorrow to appreciae happiness. It has favored us with prejudice to favor acceptance. It has rained on us to appreciate sunshine. We have witnessed wars to enjoy peace. It has given us back our historical land to enjoy all. My comments have been made within the context of reality, keeping within my heart my faith in the Creator." REMI WRONA
- 2. "I have never been asked that question before so this is a unique opportunity to express my views of what it means to me to be a Jew. The first reason I am proud of my religion is that Judaism is the basis of all religions. As the oldest religion we had and still have a responsibility to civilized society to set the example for ethical, moral, and religious equality. We are a diverse people with cultures differing from one country to the next, yet all abiding by teaching of the Torah. We are people of compassion, ready to help all others that need our help. "Tzedakah", charitable giving is the essence of caring that is what sets us apart as a unique people. Making the world a better place is our mission in many endeavors, being in medicine, law, education, and the arts. Jewish people have paved the way in research and development, business, and the humanities to serve the needs of mankind, regardless of religion or cultural differences. I am proud of who we are and who we shall be in the future. Our "homeland" of Israel and all that country stands for is a shining example of the strength of the Jewish people and the resilient nature that has sustained us through centuries of attempted annihilation we have endured. Yes, I am proud to be a Jew!" SHERRY ELIAS
- 3. "I guess I am glad and proud to be a Jew because from the time that I can remember we were looked upon as less than equal to others. There was a time when my family was turned back because we were Jewish. Why my parents wanted to move into a lovely development called Bud Lake we were turned downed when they found out that we were Jewish. But we found a better place to live. Then, as you go through history, people tried to eliminate us, but we stood up to them. Now with the State of Israel we ae respected for our ability to defend ourselves as well as for the many important things we invented and created. I AM VERY PROUD TO BE JEWISH!" AL HERBST
- 4. "I have always felt that being a Jew causes us each unique responsibilities. As a Jew, to those who aren't, my actions reflect on all of the members of my tribe. I feel strongly that my behavior should be superior, so as to enhance the image of Jewish people to those in the community who aren't of our faith. I try to remember the words my parents repeated so very often as we four daughters were growing up: 'Your name is our identity, too. Please be kind and considerate and represent us well." There was a capacity crowd at the Savannah Rec. Center. We all enjoyed the program and the food.




The video of Dr. King's letter from a Birmingham Jail was exceptional.


