Rabbi Barry H. Block wrote the following passages. On Passover, we are linked to Jews everywhere, as we sit down to Seder tables throughout the world on the same night. We recall that we have been slaves in many times and places since Egypt. We stand in awe of the fortitude of fellow Jews who have worked to set our people free from persecution throughout the ages. We acknowledge that we are the beneficiaries of the sacrifices made by our brothers and sisters in the Land of Israel. We rejoice in the freedom of our people.

Rabbi Block reminds us, "Remember the stranger, for you were strangers in the Land of Egypt." During Passover, we should be mindful of those who continue to be enslaved by poverty and hunger, by illness or by prejudice, by homelessness and by hopelessness. May you be inspired to another act of *tzedakah*, to help the needy of our community. The Haggadah tells us that we are not truly free until all men and women live in liberty and in peace.

The Seder at Temple Shalom was lovely. The Hagaddah we shared with the congregants and guests invoked the messages of Rabbi Block. The organizers and readers did a wonderful job. They include: Sheldon, Eveleen, Larry and Lynn Wallace, Michelle Uss, Ted Williams, Rosalind Gantz and yours truly. The many volunteers that contributed their time to plan the Seder and set the tables, prepare the Seder Plates, take reservations, etc. need to be thanked as well. What would we do without Erv Margulis and Gloria Rodetsky? Plus the small army of helpers.....you know who you are!

Sisterhood, led by President Miriam Jersky, also shined this month. The Women's Seder was inspiring. It truly made all who attended remember their place in history. Women hold up half the sky and the Hagaddah that we read that day empowered every single woman who was present. Thank you to the organizers. It was a wonderful experience including not just reading, but dancing and singing.

If you enjoyed Seders at your home or at a family member or friend's home, I know you also celebrated another year of shared history and freedom. It's a blessing that Seders have been part of Jewish life for thousands of years. May you and yours enjoy next year in Jerusalem or wherever you all gather to share the memories.

Work With Your Board

My name is Renee Gershman. Three years ago, I was asked if I would fill in for the job of Recording Secretary for just three months, until the new elections took place. I said "yes" and here I am today. Actually, I was quite surprised how kind and receptive the Board was to me and how I really enjoyed taking minutes. I have now served under four Presidents and continue to enjoy my place on the Board.

Since I took office, the Temple has changed and grown in many ways. My duties include recording the minutes of all of our meetings, collecting monthly reports from all of our different committees, consolidating them, and returning them to each of the Board members. All the minutes are on file in the Temple office and posted on the web site. All minutes must be approved before they are made public so that the minutes on the web site are, unfortunately, one month behind. Reading the minutes does give you a chance to see your Board at work. Monthly Board meetings are open to the Congregation and occur every third Thursday of the month starting at 3:30 pm. We would love to have you join us.

In addition, I serve as the Bingo liaison to the Board. I have worked very closely with Joanne Goldin to improve our Bingo. This continues to be a work in progress. I'm also a Bingo worker and love doing it. The people are wonderful and I find it fun.

After attending the URJ Temple Board Seminar, I assumed the chairmanship of the Board Development and Governance Committee. It was felt that Policies and Procedures should be updated and keep current. Manuals for each of these topics are on file in the Temple Office. It is my responsibility to record every motion that changes a policy or procedure and pass this information on to the appropriate people. My committee also wrote the description for Board Trustee, which had not been done before.

Since there had never been any official training for a newly elected Board, a committee was formed and a program created. I met with the new Board to discuss duties and responsibilities. Changes in By-Laws were reviewed. Specific Board roles were mentioned and a positive tone was achieved. It was emphasized that there should be respect in all communication whether face-to-face or in writing. Hopefully, the congregation is seeing an improvement in this regard. Please remember there is a Suggestion Box in the Temple and if you have any ideas, please write them down, put them in the box, and the Board will take them into consideration.

I also serve as a member of the Membership Committee and have become part of the Welcoming group on Friday nights.

Finally, it has and continues to be an honor to serve this congregation. It is of the utmost importance to me that we continue to reflect kindness and courtesy toward each other and make this Temple a warm and welcoming place where our "family of friends" continues to grow.

From the Temple Shalom By-Laws:

4. <u>Treasurer</u>: The Treasurer shall be responsible for all financial matters of the Congregation. He/she shall: supervise the billing of the congregants; collect all monies; have custody of the Congregation's funds, securities and other fiscal items; deposit all monies and other valuable effects of the Congregation in the name of and to the credit of the Congregation in such depositories as may be designated by the Board; act as Chair of the Budget Committee; render written reports of the Congregation's financial standing monthly to the Board, and at all regularly constituted Congregational Meetings, in such form as may be prescribed by the Board; keep accurate and complete physical records of all receipts and disbursements along the lines of general accounting procedures; disburse the funds of the Congregation as provided for herein.

There is a lot involved in being the Treasurer of an organization with the activity level of Temple Shalom. Fortunately, I have been involved in this activity for several years: four years on, two years off, and now in the middle of another four years. I have also been Treasurer of almost every organization of which I have been a member. It is a good fit for me since it allows me to work on my own

schedule and I can fit it with my other activities and travel, with occasional help from Ed Levine.

In this article I will focus on the major source of Income for the Temple, annual member dues. Dues are assessed once per year, based on the Budget which is approved at the November Board meeting. I bill the assessments for the next year on or about the first week in December, to allow those who want to make the donation in the current fiscal year. I prefer that members pay the full amount by check in the enclosed envelope, because this is the least work for both the office staff and the Treasurer. Other options include credit card (a call to the office), but this reduces our income by the credit card fee.

Dues must be paid by the end of February, either in full or with a partial payment and a payment schedule. You will receive letters if necessary to remind you of this schedule.

As of the last Board meeting, I am also responsible for working with hardship members. We will not allow hardship to prevent membership in Temple Shalom.

In future "Working with Your Board" articles, I expect to discuss the Budget process, the software (Rakefet) that makes this job possible, the disbursement of funds (accounts payable), reports and taxes, restricted funds, the mortgage, and answer any questions you may have.

Ritually Speaking

Kaddish prayers and the announcing of names

There are actually three different Kaddish prayers in our services. Prior to the Shema and its blessings is the Reader's Kaddish. At the end of Tefillah in the Reform prayer book is Oseh Shalom, which is the last sentence of the Kaddish, but in Conservative and Orthodox prayer books the entire Kaddish is recited. The third is the Mourners' Kaddish.

Customs over the years have changed. In our lifetime we have seen the inclusion of the matriarchs in our prayers and the counting of women for a minyan. The Mourners' Kaddish was only recited by men during the 11-month mourning period and on a yahrzeit. However, now it is proper for women to say it, as well as the entire congregation, as we are honoring all who perished during the Holocaust and those who have no one to say Kaddish for them.

When relatives, friends or fellow congregants pass away, many of us want to acknowledge the loss and announce their name(s) at the beginning of our Kaddish as part of the shloshim list. However, it is not the proper time. Names should not be included for shloshim until after a funeral, as the halacha is that the Mourners' Kaddish is recited for a deceased person by the direct mourners for the first time at the conclusion of the interment service. Therefore, it is not proper to include names until after the funeral or memorial service.





ED-JEW-CATION...DIAMONDS ARE A MOM'S BEST FRIEND

Mothers' Day is May 8th. Promise her anything, but give her a diamond. Diamonds are a Mom's best friend. A diamond is forever. A diamond is Jewish! Not so surprisingly, for hundreds of years, diamonds have been almost entirely a Jewish business. The surprise is

the actual length of time Jews have been closely involved with the gem, and not the connection to the diamond industry itself.

Until the early 18th century, all the world's diamonds came from India. Jews had trading centers in the Ottoman Empire through which all Indian diamonds passed. Caravans that brought them across Arabia traded the stones to Jewish traders for gold and silver. They resold them to Jewish merchants in Venice, Lithuania and Frankfurt. This was a natural enterprise since most traders were moneylenders who concerned themselves with assessing, repairing and selling gems that had been offered as loan collateral. Furthermore, the cutting and polishing of diamonds was one of the few crafts in which Jews were permitted to engage by the medieval guilds in Europe. By the 16th century, caravan routes were supplanted by ships. The Sephardic Jews in Portugal made arrangements with ship captains to buy diamonds directly from Indian miners. Lisbon became the main entry point in Europe for diamonds, with the market run predominately by Jews. Once diamonds arrived, Jewish merchants set up cutting factories in Lisbon and Antwerp. Poorer Ashkenazi Jews were hired as cutters and polishers. When these people were forced to flee from Lisbon, they resettled in Amsterdam, which immediately made that city the diamond center of Europe. One way or another, the Jews followed the diamonds or the diamonds followed the Jews and the connection remained.

Turning back in time, in 1725 diamonds were discovered in Brazil. The Dutch, trading in Brazil, lost control of this traffic to British sea power. Pirating was rampant. By the mid-18th century, the trading center for uncut diamonds – and Jewish diamond merchants – was London. The jewels were sold to all the royal courts of Europe. These courts chose Jewish gem experts, who became known as "Court Jews," to do the buying and selling of jewels. In Sweden it was the Isaac family; in Hamburg it was the Lippold family; and in Vienna, it was the Oppenheim family. By the end of the 18th century, virtually the entire world diamond market was controlled by Jewish traders.

Just when appeared that diamonds from India and Brazil were running out, the South African mines were discovered. The 10 leading Jewish merchants in London, fearing a flooded South African diamond market, formed a syndicate to buy up all the production from these new mines. Many of these merchants also acquired stock holdings in the De Beers mining monopoly itself. Subsequently, through political influence, a squabble over diamond mining between the German and Dutch companies was eventually settled, with the Oppenheim family becoming dominant over both.

Eventually Christians also became traders, but Jews retained their prominence. Several researchers of the history of diamond trading believe this is because the business is largely based on trust. Purchase of diamonds is conducted by credit, since diamonds change hands a number of times before they reach the final consumer who pays for them. Taking out bank loans isn't an accepted practice because of the cost and the uncertainty of the applicant's ability to pay. Trustworthiness is the key word. Professional diamond polishers mainly belong to the closed ultra-orthodox world, and the exclusion from that community because of theft would seriously impact reputations and the legacy of the diamond world. Respected diamond traders make good money and hope to pass the reins to their children, so they have a huge interest in protecting their good names. Most diamond deals, especially those made by the orthodox Jews, are made on a handshake alone. (You can still see this being done if you look closely when visiting the diamond district in New York City.)

The long history of expulsion from countries further ensured that diamonds are a Jew's best friend. They are an easily transported asset and are of universal value. The tools of diamond polishing are small, enabling a continuation of the trade in a new environment, especially after WWII, refugees and other immigrants to Israel helped make Israel the largest diamond wholesaler in the world, supplying over 50% of all cut and polished diamonds, with the USA importing the majority. So to sum it up, it's because of a combination of geographical, religious, historical, and political reasons that the Jews have such prominence in the diamond industry.

And remember...our friends at Temple Shalom are true diamonds - bright, beautiful, valuable, and forever!
