Through Iris' Eyes

Friday, March 10 was Hadassah Shabbat Zachor. As a life-time member of Hadassah, I was honored to join every Hadassah Chapter nationally to recognize the annual Hadassah Shabbat which is designated on the Shabbat before Purim.

Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization of America, is the largest women's Jewish membership organization in the United States. Founded in 1912, Hadassah boasts that they are 330,000 members, associates, and supporters strong. Hadassah is now in its second century, growing their commitment to innovative and life-changing medical care and research, women's empowerment, education, advocacy, philanthropy and building Jewish identity — in Israel, America and around the world.

The Parshat before Purim, Zachor, holds particular importance as Hadassah was founded during Purim and was Esther's Hebrew name. Hadassah encouraged rabbis and congregations to become part of the first Hadassah Shabbat Zachor on March 14 and 15, 2014.

Parshat Zachor, reminds us how evil can be transformed into good, focusing on the victory of the Israelites over Amalek and of Esther and Vashti over oppression and discrimination. Zachor, the Shabbat of Remembrance, is when we read from the Torah how the Amalekites attacked us out of senseless hatred. The Torah commands us to never forget this evil, and to "eradicate the memory of Amalek." Since Haman was a descendant of Amalek, we do this before Purim. It's a once-a-year obligation.

Rabbi Julie Schonfeld, Executive Vice President of the Rabbinical Assembly of the Conservative Movement states, "The story of Esther emphasizes Jewish women's pivotal role in our communities. The Rabbinical Assembly encourages congregations to reflect on women's equality during Hadassah Shabbat."

Hadassah National Past President Marcie Natan comments, "Hadassah Shabbat Zachor will strengthen old memories of these teachings while welcoming new connections during the celebratory and reflective time of Purim, when Hadassah came to be. Hadassah will partner with congregations of all denominations to provide tools and readings as well as speakers to open discussion on the teachings of Parshat Zachor.

"Hadassah is an organization which inspires passion for the land of Israel, the health and wellness of people worldwide, and Jewish education. Hadassah Shabbat will celebrate and connect our many goals and missions back to their origin, the Torah."

In these times of anti-semitic resurgence, Hadassah has a long history of speaking out

against anti- Semitism. The "Combating Anti-Semitism" policy statement was passed in 2014. As a member organization of the Conference of Presidents of Major American Jewish Organizations and the Jewish Council for Public Affairs, Hadassah joins with their leaders in recognizing that hatred against the Jews is not only a problem for our community but for all of society.

Since February 27, 2017 there have been over 150 incidents at JCCs and Jewish day schools across 33 states and 2 Canadian provinces. The Jewish community is mourning the desecration of gravestones at Jewish cemeteries in University City, Missouri and Philadelphia, and numerous other acts of anti-Semitic vandalism and graffiti have been reported throughout the country. National Hadassah recently released a statement in solidarity with friends and partners at local JCCs throughout the country.

Hadassah states loud and clear, that now is a time for action. Hadassah will always be there to fight the forces of hate as prescribed in the Torah. As Jews, we have an obligation to help Hadassah stand up to the evil doers.

Ed-Jew-Cation: The Same Old Story



Every year we gather together at Passover to read the ancient story of Moses, a prince of a guy, who, with a little help from above.... OK – with a LOT of help from above, was able to free the Jews from generations of cruel bondage in Egypt. It's really a terrific tale, complete with murder, mayhem, and miracles. And it even has a happy ending.

We all know the name of this book: The Haggadah, which in translation means "the telling". Perhaps, though, there should be a fifth

question to ask everyone at the Seder table.... Who wrote the Haggadah and when? (WARNING: The following answer may be long and boring and filled with alternative facts. If you do not have the curiosity or patience to read further, please feel free to "pass over" it and go directly to the "Two-Minute Haggadah" which is printed elsewhere in this issue of *The Shalom*.)

So then... those who study this kind of thing believe that the starting point of circa 170 C.E. – 200 C.E. is when, in Judea, the Haggadah was compiled into its present form by a committee of the learned rabbis of that era. Another theory is that since much of the text of the Haggadah dates from the Second Temple period, it may have been compiled as early as 520 B.C.E. -70 C.E. The first mention of a Seder service was found approximately 90 C.E. in the Mishnah of the Talmud by Rabbi Gamaliel, who was President of the Jewish legislative body in Jerusalem, known as the Sanhedrin. The earliest version of the Haggadah that is still in existence is from the 9th century C.E., contained in the prayer book of Amram Gaon, the leader of the Jewish academy of learning in Babylonia. Fragments from this book were discovered in the Cairo repository/archive for ancient Jewish sacred writings. By the 13th century, C.E. the first Haggadah appeared as a separate writing and not as part of the Jewish prayer book.

In the latter part of the 13th century, the first illuminated Haggadah manuscript for Ashkenazi Jews was created. Its title is: "The Bird's Head Haggadah", so called because many of the persons depicted in the manuscript have the head of a bird, while other persons have the head of other animals. This depiction was likely because of the belief that showing human heads would have constituted graven images alongside sacred text, which was forbidden in the 2nd Commandment. "The Bird's Head" was the Haggadah that introduced the baking of the matzos into the story of the exodus from Egypt. The earliest illuminated manuscript for Sephardic Jews has the title, "The Golden Haggadah", and was created near Barcelona, Spain, probably for a wealthy family. The most famous ancient Haggadah, also from the 13th century, written in Hebrew, is the Sarajevo Haggadah, It is a modern miracle that this beautifully fashioned manuscript survived centuries of expulsion, oppression, genocide, and two modern wars, and is now housed in the National Museum of Bosnia and Herzegovina in Sarajevo, Bosnia. The text is hand written, and because wine stains were found on some pages, it was undoubtedly used at a Seder. It wasn't until 1486 that there was a confirmed printing of the Haggadah, which came from the printing press of the Italian Jewish Soncino family of Italy.

The first Haggadah printed in the USA was by Solomon Jackson, a Jewish English immigrant, in New York City, in 1837. The classic Maxwell House Haggadah was published for the first time by the Joseph Jacobs Advertising Agency of NYC., in 1932. After the coffee bean was declared kosher for Passover, General Foods with the help of the Jacobs Advertising Agency, marketed Maxwell House coffee as the coffee for the holiday, and sales increased. Then Jacobs developed a simple Haggadah for distribution free with the purchase of any Maxwell House coffee product. This Haggadah is still being produced, making it the longest running sales promotion in advertising history, with well over 50 million copies being printed. It is the most widely circulated Judaica item in the world. The Maxwell House Haggadah was the Haggadah of choice at a 2009 Seder hosted by President Barack Obama at the White House.

And so here we are, 2000 years later, still telling the same old story. But now the way of telling it is becoming more diverse. In the 16th century there were about 25 printed versions. By the 20th century there were over 3000 versions of this most popular Jewish book of all time. Karen Rockard, writer and publisher of "The Santa Cruz Haggadah" admonishes: "Whichever Haggadah you use, remember to make sure you observe one of the oldest traditions of all: make sure you leave a few wine stains on it. A Haggadah that has no wine stains is generally seen as a Haggadah that has not 'lived'"!

Passoyer Two-Minute Haggadah



A Passover service for the Impatient, by Michael Rubiner

On Monday night, April 10, at sundown, Jews everywhere will begin celebrating the first night of Passover. Before they can eat their unleavened meal, though, they'll have to complete the Seder, a religious service conducted on the first and sometimes second nights of the eight-day holiday that can often seem interminable.

In 2006, Michael Rubiner (a writer for movies and television) drafted a plan for a shorter, sweeter Seder. His proposal is printed below.



OPENING PRAYERS:

Thanks, God, for creating wine. (Drink wine) Thanks for creating produce. (Eat parsley.)

OVERVIEW: Once we were slaves in Egypt. Now we're free. That's why we're doing this.

FOUR QUESTIONS:

1. What's up with the matzoh? 2. What's the deal with horseradish? 3. What's with the dipping of the herbs? 4. What's this whole slouching at the table business?

ANSWERS:

- 1. When we left Egypt we were in a hurry. There was not time for making decent bread.
- 2. Life was bitter, like horseradish. 3. It's called symbolism. 4. Free people get to slouch.

A FUNNY STORY: Once these five rabbis talked all night, then it was morning. (Heat soup now).

THE FOUR KINDS OF CHILDREN AND HOW TO DEAL WITH THEM:

- 1. Wise child explain Passover
- 2. Simple child explain Passover slowly
- 3. Silent child explain Passover loudly.
- 4. Wicked child browbeat in front of the relatives.

Speaking of children: We hid some matzoh. Whoever finds it gets five bucks.

THE STORY OF PASSOVER: It's a long time ago. We're slaves in Egypt. Pharaoh is a nightmare. We cry out for help. God brings plagues upon the Egyptians. We escape, bake some matzoh. God parts the Red Sea. We make it through; the Egyptians aren't so lucky. We wander 40 years in the desert, eat manna, get the Torah, wind up in Israel, get a new temple, enjoy several years without being persecuted again. (Let brisket cool now)

THE TEN PLAGUES: Blood, Frogs, Lice – you name it.

SINGING OF "DAYENU": If God had gotten us out of Egypt and not punished our enemies, it would've been enough. If He'd punished our enemies and not parted the Red Sea, it would've been enough. If He'd parted the Red Sea – (Remove gefilte fish from refrigerator now). Eat matzoh. Drink more wine. Slouch.

CLOSING PRAYER: Thanks again, God, for everything. Amen.


