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



Kisses and Knishes By Rosalind Gantz and Ann Jasper

Rosalind: I didn't have the experience of growing up with an extended family nearby. My parents left their birthplace of New York and moved to Maryland in the early 1940's. They left behind sisters, brothers, nieces and nephews. They did bring with them the religious traditions of their parents that they had grown up with. My mother would light the Shabbat candles on Friday evening, and prepare a special meal for us to enjoy. We ate on special plates (that I still use) on Passover, and attended High Holiday services with a lay leader in a local church.

XXXXXXX After WWII was over, we were able to make trips to New York to visit the various members of the family. It was on these trips that I learned what it was like to have cousins nearby to play and bond with. The highlight of these trips was always the meals that one or another of the aunts would prepare for the whole family. We would be stuffed full of homemade brisket, noodle kugels, and delicious desserts. For breakfast, we would enjoy bagels and lox and whitefish, all things that were not available for us in Maryland.

When a kosher deli finally opened near us it became a tradition to travel there once a month to stock up on all the delicacies that we had been missing out on. The deli meats, cheeses, breads and baked goods were eaten with much relish. We would dole out the goodies in order to make everything last until our next trip.

XXXXXXXXX Ann: I was seven when we first got a car, and we were able to take our first summer vacation. <u>Ann:</u> I was seven when we first got a car, and we were able to take our first summer vacation. My father appointed me his navigator, showed me a collection of maps, and guided me while I mapped our way from our home in The Bronx to Michigan so we could visit my mother's cousin and her family. I sat in the front seat and followed the trip while my father asked me questions, such as how many miles it would be to the next town, would we need to stop for gas soon, etc. He also would point out cows in the fields, what their breed was, and the advantages to that He also would point out cows in the fields, what their breed was, and the advantages to that breed. He identified birds and told me about their habits. He would tell me what was growing in the fields we were passing. He also told me the names of trees and flowers that we saw. My father knew everything. Two days later, we were in Michigan, at a small town near the Kaiser-Frazer auto plant where the man of the house worked. We were able to tour the plant, and so we saw an assembly line. We attended a horse auction. We toured the Henry Ford Museum and saw the cars, trains, stagecoaches, etc. that were on exhibit. We stayed with our cousins, and we became friends and playmates. The house was on four acres of land, two of which were cultivated, with every sort of vegetable and many fruits. For the first

time, I saw potatoes and sweet potatoes growing, rows of salad (different kinds of lettuce, X X X X X X X X X X X X X X X X radishes, scallions, tomatoes, and cucumbers). When it was time to prepare a meal, we would go out into the vast garden, and pick salad, and vegetables (maybe corn and green beans), and perhaps a watermelon for dessert. How good the really fresh food from that garden was!

Recipe: Not really. Rather, a suggestion. Take advantage of the farmers' markets in The Villages and at the Marion Market, and load up your dinner plate with vegetables. Go vegetarian one night a week. Or use fish, chicken, or cheese as a small part of your meal, rather than the main focus. (1)Vegetables such as zucchini, squash, potatoes, sweet potatoes can be tossed with a little salt and pepper and olive oil, spread on a cookie sheet, and baked for a delicious treat. (2)Corn, broccoli, cauliflower, carrots, asparagus are great when steamed. (3) Make a stir fry with your favorite vegetables; and if you'd like, stir in a little shredded chicken. (4)Saute a little garlic in olive oil, add some diced tomatoes, salt and pepper, then perhaps corn kernels, peas, diced carrots; toss it into spaghetti squash; and if you'd like, top with a little grated cheese.

Recently I had the pleasure of visiting the Metropolitan Museum of Art, a long-overdue item on my bucket list. Having only 3 precious hours t spend, I had to pick out the exhibitions I most wanted to see. .. the old masters and the impressionists. When it came time to write Ed-Jev Cation, I thought Jewish painters would be a great topic. Well, you know what folks? - there just are many famous Jewish artists! Who can you name beside Marc Chagall? Considering the heavy proportion of Jews in the arts ... music, theatre, literature, e.g. ... the representation on canvas is scant. Of course, there is that injunction about "graven images", but even so. Actually, Jewish visual arts date back to the biblical times, with the commission to build the Tabernacle in the wilderness, and the requirement to beautify ritual items and sacred spaces. Archeologists have foun murals painted on synagogue walls, and intricate mosaics on the floors, attesting to the artistic craftsmanship of the ancient Jews. With the destruction of the Temple, and the diaspo the only art work of any import was the making of items such as Kiddush cups, mezuzot, candlestick and Torah embellishments. The exception to this was the illumination of Haggadahs and ketubahs, which were often of museum quality beauty. But for art's sake was not even imagined. Daniel Oppenheim (1799-1882) has been referred by some as the "first Jewish painter". RITUALLY SPEAKING

This year, on Monday, September 14, immediately after the Rosh Hashanah Service, Spiritual Leader Sheldon Skurow will conduct a brief Tashlich ceremony at the Lake at Summerhill. The Villages has given Temple Shalom permission to meet at the lake and to park in the mail/pool lot right across the street. Afterwards, those who wish to can have lunch together at a Villages restaurant.

Tashlich is a very old ritual. The word "tashlich" in Hebrew means "to cast away." Nehemiah (8:1) states, "All the Jews gathered as one in the street that is in front of the gate of water." This gathering is known to have taken place on Rosh Hashanah. Since then, Ashkenazi and Sephardic Jews have met at rivers, lakes or other bodies of water, preferably ones filled with fish and paddled on by ducks. We say brief prayers; meditate on our lives and throw bread crumbs into the water. We cast away our sins. We hope to be better people in the New Year. We feel good.

We hope to see you at Tashlich.


