Israel Solidarity Committee

On November 1, 2017, there will be a momentous program at Temple Shalom.

Rebecca Shimoni-Stoil, Washington Correspondent, will speak to us about “JERUSALEM-PAST-PRESENT-FUTURE”. This topic was selected due to the 50th anniversary of Jerusalem’s reunification May 23-24.

Here are some highlights of the rich tapestry of Israel’s capital:

Reunification

- *Jerusalem Day is an Israeli national holiday commemorating the reunification of Jerusalem in the 1967 Six Day War.
- *During the Jordanian occupation of Jerusalem, Jews were not allowed to access their holy sites, including the Western Wall.

History

- *Jerusalem has been attacked 52 times, captured and recaptured 44 times, besieged 23 times and destroyed twice over the course of 3,000 years.
- *The name “Jerusalem” most likely comes from “Urusalim”, a word of Semitic origin meaning “Foundation of Shalem (wholeness) or “Foundation of God”.

Religion

- *Jerusalem has more synagogues per capita than any city in the world.
- *Jerusalem is the only city in which some 15 different Christian communities live alongside one another, according to the Jerusalem Institute for Israel Studies.
- *Jerusalem is considered the eternal capital of the Jewish people.
- *Jerusalem is mentioned more than 600 times in the Hebrew Bible, but not once in Islam’s Quran.
- *There are more than 70 different names for Jerusalem in Jewish scripture.
- *The Old City of Jerusalem is divided into the Muslim Quarter, Christian Quarter, Jewish Quarter and Armenian Quarter.

Government

- *Although all branches of the Israel Government are headquartered in Jerusalem, the city is not home to any foreign embassies.

Demographics

- *Jerusalem is Israel’s largest city in both landmass and population.
- *Jerusalem’s population is comprised of 61 percent Jews, 36 percent Muslims,

1 percent Arab Christians and 1 percent non-Arab Christians.

*Thirty-four percent of Jerusalem's Jews identify as Haredi.

Economy

*Jerusalem is home to more than 400 high-tech companies.

*Fourteen percent of the Jerusalem workforce is self-employed.

*This year, a noticeably high proportion (almost 50 percent) of newcomers to Jerusalem were 20-34 years old.

*The new immigrant population of Jerusalem (those arriving in the past 20 years) represents about 13 percent of the city's Jewish population.

A SALUTE TO OUR JEWISH WAR VETERANS

The oldest continuously operating veterans' service organization in the country is that of the Jewish War Veterans. It was created in 1896 by Jewish Civil War Veterans to prove to the nation that Jews have proudly served this country since the Revolutionary War era and to try to alleviate anti-semitism in the military. The JWV organization holds a congressional charter under Title 36 of the U.S. Code.

At roll call on March 15, 1896, at a meeting held at the Lexington Opera House in NYC, there were 63 members. They were known as the Hebrew Union Veterans.

On May 30th 1927, the first memorial service for fallen soldiers and sailors of Jewish faith was held at B'nai Jeshru Synagogue, where the recently ordained 24 year old Stephen Wise conducted the services. Rabbi Wise's ties to the Jewish War Veterans organization remained throughout his career. After WWI, the leaders of the organization changed its name to Hebrew Veterans of Wars of the Republic and then in 1924 the name changed to Jewish War Veterans of the Republic. In 1927 it was responsible for gaining federal legislation to place the Star of David on the markers on graves of Jewish military killed in France. Until then, all graves were marked with a cross. The final name change came in 1929, when the group became known as the Jewish War Veterans of the United States. There are currently approximately 15,000 members, past and active duty military personnel and over 250 posts.

The Jewish War Veterans in the tri-county area was initiated in 2011, by Gerry Prezioso and the late Marty Lasker, and a post was formed in The Villages in 2012. It was named for astronaut Judith Resnick, a reform Jewess, who died on the space shuttle Challenger when it exploded. The membership includes veterans from WWII through the Middle East wars. Barbara Fieldman is the only female veteran in the group, and Robert Via is the veteran holding the highest rank of general. Also the JWV is proud of its wounded veteran, Isaac Fretz, who was severely injured in Iraq. Gerry Prezioso, commander of the post, would like everyone to attend the service at Temple Shalom on November 10 when all veterans will be honored. Donations for needy veterans in this area would be appreciated.

November 11 is nationally recognized as a day to honor all of those men and women who have served in the armed forces of our country. If you are old enough to remember, the date originally marked Armistice Day -- November 11, 1918, the end of WWI. In 1954 the name was changed so that military personnel of ALL conflicts, and even of peacetime, were thanked for their service to America.

Her food and presentation, had so many people asking for recipes and guidance she started inviting people to her home monthly to demonstrate how easy it is to serve food that has the 'wow' factor.

"Poached salmon, my Hilton Head sauce and the fig and brie cups are three perfect examples of easy-to-make, but very impressive recipes, I have included in the cookbook," said Byer. She includes lots of chef notes with her recipes. "People just need to think that they can do it," said Byer. "Confidence is key in cooking."

"I love playing with food," said Byer. "It is a wonderful way to make friends and be creative."

Ed-Jew-Cation: Things that go bump in the night

I scream, you scream, we all scream for ... ice cream? Noooooooo. Ghosts! Yes, a Jew goes "boo!", too. Back since Biblical times ancient rabbis, Jewish thinkers, Kabbalists, and Talmudic scholars all dabbled in supernatural beings. Ghosts are mentioned in the Hebrew Bible in Deuteronomy, when Moses warned the children of Israel not to get mixed up with soothsayers, sorcerers, ones who cast spells, or anyone who consults ghosts or familiar spirits. Should we assume that the Bible implies that the world of magic, ghosts, and spirits



is real, and the “boogey-man will getcha’ if you don’t watch out?” Moses was concerned about his people, since Jews always co-existed with other tribes and cultures, and some beliefs and practices of those surrounding people could become incorporated into their thinking, causing them to become sinful. Thus, when King Saul requested the Witch of Endor (a soothsayer from the nearby town of Endor) to conjure up the ghost of Samuel for help, he knew he was committing a grave (get it? Grave?) sin. Samuel’s ghost supposedly was annoyed and asked Saul, “Why have you disturbed me and brought me up?” The next day King Saul suffered his downfall. Apparently Jews should let sleeping ghosts lie.

Yet when Jews lived in Babylon, they were then influenced by the Chaldean and Persian belief in good and evil spirits. While in Europe, Jewish forms of superstition took on some of the qualities of the Teutonic, Celtic, and Slavic practices. It is probably from these sources that Judaism has its own witches, like the famous Lilith. She morphed from being the first wife of Adam to being a she-devil that represents unchecked sexuality and the dangers of an uncontrollable woman. Now that’s really scary! Then there’s the supernatural creatures like dybbuks and golems. Dybbuks are the bad spirits that attach themselves to a living person’s soul causing mental illnesses like alien personalities. They are definitely to be watched out for, even though there is literature on how to exorcise the evil parasite and redeem the soul of the afflicted. Golems, Jewish Franksteins, are actually nice guys made by hand by a rabbi to help a community in times of deep trouble. Although they have been known to run amok, basically they are like Casper (the ghost) Milquetoast.

Getting back to Jewish ghosts, there are several rather well-known ghost stories associated with real live Jews. One tells of a woman named Julia Staab, who, to this day, walks the staircase and second-floor suite of the old La Posada Hotel in Santa Fe, NM. Julia arrived in Santa Fe in 1865, a 21-year-old bride of Abraham Staab. She had been raised in a cultured home in Germany and found the Wild West difficult. Abraham became a very wealthy merchant and built a magnificent (for that area) home for his wife and 7 children, which they called La Posada. It is said by some of the locals that Abraham was abusive and Julia became depressed. Others say that after the death of the eighth child, she indulged in forbidden love, family feuds and stages of madness. The stories are unclear as to whether she was murdered or committed suicide. Whatever caused her early demise, she had a restless soul and has been seen by guests in her home, that was much later turned into the Hotel Posada. She is seen wearing a long black gown and has caused chandeliers to sway, glasses to slide off shelves, and lights to go off and on at odd times. Her great-great-granddaughter, Hannah Nordhaus, has written a book about Julia. If you like ghost stories, it sounds haunting.

Theatre people enjoy the specter of David Belasco, the most powerful personality in the NYC theatre scene in the 1920s. From his death in 1931 until 1972 (at the showing of “Oh! Calcutta!”) his presence was seen and felt constantly at the old Belasco Theatre. His apparition was sometimes dressed in a cossack and clerical collar; he was known as the “Bishop of Broadway.” Sometimes he could be seen seated in the balcony wearing his famous black cape and dressed quite nattily. His ghost was known to pinch actresses’ tushies, speak to actors after performances, wreck a dressing room if the performance was unsatisfactory, open and close doors, turn lights on and off, and make the curtains move. A theatre dog used to bark at 4 p.m. at something unseen. Was it the ghost of David? And though she was not real, who could forget the theatrical ghost of Gramma Tzeitel in “Fiddler on the Roof”? She was a scream!

Perhaps “Ghostbusters” should have been brought in, since they were created by Harold Ramis and the movie about them was produced by Ivan Reitman. Being Jewish themselves, they have probably learned how to make Jewish apparitions disappear. Even though Halloween (All Hallow’s Eve) is not a Jewish holiday, it is a spooky one. So it’s a good idea to listen for and be careful of “things that go bump in the night” - although it’s probably just your spouse getting up to use the bathroom!

You, my readers, are all “**BOO-ti-ful**”, and I hope I stand “a ghost of a chance with you.”
