



Meryl Simon still remembers sitting beside her mother in Brooklyn watching her play mahjongg on warm summer evenings.

"She would let me sit next to her and watch," said Simon, Village of Pine Ridge. "I couldn't wait until I was old enough to

play. She bought me my own set when I was 10.

Now, decades later, the Temple Shalom Sisterhood president helps lead mah-jongg card sales, which has turned a lifelong game

into a major charitable effort. "In 1937, several hundred Jewish women in New York City formed the National Mah-Jongg League," Simon said. "They created an annual card with winning hands to add consistency

and excitement to the game."

This year, the Sisterhood sold over 5,500 National Mah-Jongg League cards, raising thousands of dollars for Hospice of Marion County, Cornerstone Hospice and Palliative Care and Haven of Lake & Sumter Counties.

The card sales are coordinated through the National Mah-Jongg League, which returns a portion





of each sale to the Temple Shalom Sisterhood. The cards are sold at the same price as the League, but proceeds stay

"The number of cards sold has been staggering," said Susan Feinberg, Temple Shalom of Central Florida marketing coordinator.

"We are selling more cards every year because more people want to support the causes we donate to, and they love the game," she said. "It's the best of both worlds. You get your card, and you know the money is staying in the community."

Feinberg said the growth has been fueled not just by interest in mah-jongg, but by the personal connections made through it.

"It's not just a game," said Feinberg, of the Village of Pennecamp.

"It's part of our culture and history in America," she said. "So many women and men have made close friendships through mah-jongg."

**B**ehind the scenes, the effort is powered by a tight-knit team of volunteers with a nod of gratitude to Carolyn Cass, who developed a custom computer program to manage the card orders.

"Carolyn's a computer genius," Simon said. "She created the program that lets us enter all the orders and submit them to the League. It makes it easy for someone like

Villagers can order a single card or dozens at a time for friends. Volunteers then painstakingly enter the data line by line into Excel spreadsheets.

"It's a labor of love," Simon said. "We have a wonderful committee. Everyone pitches


who inherited her mother-in-

law's set. "A lot of women I know have their mothers' mah-jongg sets," she said. "It's very nostalgic. This is a game our families

played." Mah-jongg enjoys widespread appeal across generations and backgrounds.

'When I moved to The Villages, I was surprised at how many people played," Simon said. "I used to think it was a Jewish women's game. But it turns out people

everywhere are discovering how much joy it brings.'

The Temple Shalom Sisterhood also hosts four mahjongg tournaments each year, which regularly sell out with

144 players filling the room.

"They're really a lot of fun and run like a well-oiled machine," Simon said.

'People come from all over Florida and even Georgia to

play," she said. "You get to meet new people and play a

game you love."

Temple Shalom of Central Florida's next mah-jongg tournament is from 8:45 a.m. to 2:25 p.m. Nov. 5 at 13563 County Road 101, Oxford. Entry is a \$55 donation.

"There are people who say, 'I'm afraid to play, I don't know enough, but everyone is welcome," Simon said. "It's a warm and inviting space. We even have people in our group who teach others.

Simon herself has taught several friends to play since moving to The Villages.

**66** I wanted to play so badly when I moved here," she said. "So I taught my friends in the neighborhood and now they're hooked too."

What began as a family tradition has evolved into a thriving community of players and a meaningful way to give back.

"It's grown every year," Simon said. "More and more people in The Villages are playing. Some have never even played before moving here. It's amazing to see."
