But she turned the tables on him. She got a **list of the invitees to her party and called each one. “I’d like to surprise my husband,” she told them. Then she explained what he sacrificed for her to go back to school.** He supported her emotionally when she felt like quitting. Much like a single parent, he juggled his own work with picking the children up from school, caring for them in the evenings, shouldering much of the housework and preparing meals for the family. And besides, her education was expensive and the family needed to take out a student loan. **“I’d like this to be a surprise party for him instead of a graduation party for me,” she told all of her guests.**

So they came with cards and food, all of which he expected. But when he learned that it was all for him, he was stunned! And for her, it turned out to be the greatest graduation party ever.

He showed her by his actions and by his willingness to sacrifice that she knew she was loved, cared for, and important. And this gave her the courage to jump into a demanding program that others may never have attempted.

You are loved...you are cared for...you are important. Where love exists there is warmth. Where **everyone’s physical and emotional needs are met, there is safety and security. And where respect for one another is the norm, the mind and spirit can flourish.**

It doesn’t get much better than that.

And that is why Ellen and I are joining you.

Ed-Jew-Cation: A Revoltin' Development



"In '76 the sky was red. Thunder rumbling overhead. Bad King George couldn't sleep in his bed. And on that stormy morn, Ol' Uncle Sam was born." Those words are from "Ballad for Americans", which tells the story, in song, of the American Revolutionary War. On the 4th of July we honor the signing of the Declaration of Independence, which proclaimed self-rule

for the newly established colonies. Some historians say that the rebels likened their quest for freedom to the Hebrews vs. Pharaoh. The Puritans had come to America from England, seeking religious freedom. They cried out to their English ruler, "Let my people go"...which he did not do ... and so there was lots of revoltin' going on.

And where were the Hebrews in all this call for independence? Actually there were only about 2,000 Hebrews abiding in the colonies in 1776. Like the rest of the population, among these few Jews there were split loyalties, to the king, to the new government of the colonists, or simply non-committal. They had religious freedom, for which they had come to the New World. They had their livelihood – mostly mercantile-- and life was looking pretty good for them. Yet, “The importance of the Revolution on world Jewish history cannot be underestimated,” said Jacob Marcus, Director of American Jewish Archives of Hebrew Union College. According to him, the Jews interpreted “life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness” to mean political, social, and economic opportunity, as well as religious equality.”

Having Jewish men in the military service of the Patriot’s army was significant because Jews had been historically excluded from western militaries. In England, to serve in the military as an officer, a Jew had to take an oath as a Christian. Such a large number of Southern Jews wanted to join the cause that Cpt. Richard Lushington, a Jew from Charleston, SC, formed what was known as “the Jews Company”, which included 28 men half his company. Francis Salvador, a legendary southern patriot, was the first Jew to die for his country and was considered a hero. Colonel Isaac Franks was known as George Washington’s right hand man and they remained friends for years after the war. David Franks, a distant relative of Isaac, was the aide de camp of the notorious Benedict Arnold, Oy vay! He got arrested with Arnold’s other aides. He was acquitted; however he was not content with that outcome. He requested and received an additional court inquiry to completely clear his name. Only in America – Franks was totally exonerated, promoted and given 400 acres of land. And to make it even better, he became a diplomatic courier carrying documents to Benjamin Franklin in Paris and John Jay in Madrid. In 1784 he was appointed vice consul in France, becoming the first Jew to serve in a U.S. diplomatic post. How’s that for a nice Jewish soldier?

Not only were these Hebrew Patriots in the military, but they served the military as suppliers of clothing and armament. There were even Jewish privateers plying the seas, smuggling goods thru the British blockade. There are a few historians who would go so far as to say that the American Revolution was won because of Jews such as Haym Salomon (a Polish Jew who had immigrated at the age of 32 and was a currency trader) and the Jews of St. Eustatius, in the Caribbean, who were primarily in the shipping business. Salomon is best known as the man who negotiated Colonial currency and bonds for hard Dutch and French currencies and who loaned his personal fortune (approximately \$350,000... a huge sum) to the newly formed Congress with no interest. He practically financed the whole war, and his financial skills with America’s allies enormously helped to rescue the Continental government. Sadly, the money was never repaid, and he died virtually bankrupt.

The Jews might well be considered the original “Pirates of the Caribbean”, smuggling vital goods from Amsterdam based firms, through St. Eustatius, to the colonies. Their ships posed such a problem that Britain sent Adm. Rodney to stop the contraband traffic. Rodney was a bigot and particularly hated Jews (The Haman of his time). In fact, he was so taken with ridding the island of Jews, ransacking homes, burning the synagogue, pillaging property, and deporting Jewish men that he forgot about the rest of the war. Instead of tracking and trying to destroy the French fleet, he sent half his ships back to England carrying booty stolen from the Jews and other Dutch merchants. The French were able to stop troop replacements coming from England, Gen. Cornwallis’s army was decimated, and Washington declared victory. So there!!!

One more interesting note: There was a great parade in Philadelphia in 1788 to honor Pennsylvania’s ratification of the U.S. Constitution. The cantor of the synagogue marched arm and arm with two clergymen. At the public feast for that celebration there was a table with kosher food that consisted of “soused salmon, bread and crackers, almonds, raisins, and more.” One more great moment in Jewish history of “We won, let’s eat!”

So even if you’re not a Son or a Daughter of the Revolutionary War (let’s face it, very few of us are!) , know that as a Jew, and an American, all of us are proud of our heritage and are indeed grateful for those valiant Patriots who stood so bravely for freedom and equality.

Israel Solidarity Committee


A movie named *In Our Hands: The Battle for Jerusalem* depicts “A 50 Year Love Story.”

On May 24, 2017, Jerusalem Day was celebrated in Israel commemorating the 50th anniversary of the reunification of Jerusalem on June 7, 2017. In 1967, a Six-Day War ensued with a 200,000 person Israeli army who fought against a one million person Arab army. The movie, “*In Our Hands: The Battle for Jerusalem*” depicts the continual yearning of Jews to reunite Jerusalem as it had been under King David. Accordingly, Israel celebrated the 50th historical moment in time. Truly *Hashem* was at work fulfilling prophecy from the Torah. And the people of the Villages said, “**L**et us plant grass, and flowers, and trees, and lots of churches... And they did. But there was a darkness upon that earth because there was no place for the Jews of The Villages. **A**nd Jack Vitale, a Christian amongst the Jews, said, “**I** need a place for my beloved Jewess, Sharna, to be with her people, to eat a bagel with them, and to play Mah Jongg.” And so it was that he and a few other wise men gathered the tribesmen together in friendship. And they saw that it was good. And the second day there was evening and morning and The Jewish Friends Club.

And the Jewish Friends Club grew and flourished. And more Jews were seen upon the face of The Villages earth. **A**nd lo, the people of the Friends Club proclaimed, “**L**et us be a congregation which joins together our faith and friendship.” And they did. And they saw that it was good. And the third day there was morning and evening and The New Jewish Congregation.

And the leaders of that congregation said, “**W**e are wandering...Jews. Worshipping in strange tabernacles is O.K., **but not really kosher.**” And so there was land finding and name picking, and planning and designing and recruiting of members, and much, much fund raising... And it was gooood. And the fourth day there was morning and evening and the beginnings of a Temple.

And behold, there arose on a back road of the land a beautiful building, the pride and joy of the founding fathers and mothers. And they marched and they sang and they danced and they brought the holy books into their Temple with great rejoicing. And they saw that it was very, very good. And the fifth day there was morning and evening and Temple Shalom.

And the multitude of Temple Shalom knew the great spirit of Sheldon Skurow and thus he was proclaimed the Spiritual Leader. And a joyful noise was heard from him and the choir of Temple Shalom. And the brothers of the hood and the sisters of the hood worked diligently and brought fame and fortune to the neighbor-hood of their temple. And the sixth day there was morning and evening and Temple Shalom shone as a bright star, a Jewish star, upon the land of The Villages.

And the Spiritual Leader said, “**I** have proudly served as your leader for 16 years. I am now an elder. A new leader should take the congregation into the future. And so a rabbi from a faraway land was chosen. And the congregation and Sheldon, the Spiritual Leader, in good spirit, saw that it was going to be really, really good. And it was morning and evening on the 7th day. And Sheldon rested. AMEN!

SHELDON SKUROW reminisces about his years with Temple Shalom

- Q. So, Sheldon, you're getting ready to retire as Spiritual Leader of Temple Shalom. How did you get started in that capacity? Did you have any previous background leading a congregation?
- A. Not professionally. When I was in the Navy, many years ago, there were very few other Jewish crew members on my ship, The USS Coral Sea, so there was no chaplain for us. An officer asked if I would provide a service for my fellow Jews. I readily agreed. I had had an Orthodox upbringing in Baltimore, so I was familiar with the service. And we were happy to gather together on Friday nights and holidays -- not only for the spiritual part, but it gave us time off from regular duty!
- Q. What brought you to The Villages?
- A. **Easy answer...golf!! Whoever heard of “playing golf for free for the rest of your life?”**
- Q. You and Eveleen, like the rest of us when we came here, were looking for a Jewish presence. What did you find?
- A. In 2000 there was a Jewish Friends Club, started by **Jack Vitale, Sharna’s husband.** There were about 14 people to start with, but it grew rapidly. When there were about 75 members, there was talk initiated about starting a Temple.
- Q. Historically, that was the beginning of The New Jewish Congregation. Tell me about that.
- A. Well, we started out meeting at the Hacienda Hills center and then migrated to the Oxford Community Center where we could hold services. That was in 2001. We elected a president, set up a Ritual Committee, found some prayer books, and had a great donation of a very small Torah, which you can now see framed in the sanctuary. I was elected as 1st V.P. of the congregation and also became the lay leader of the services, once a month.
- Q. We all remember that after 4 years of being wandering Jews in different places of worship, our dream came true, and Temple Shalom was established. You were asked to continue in your role, designated as Spiritual Leader. What were your feelings about that?
- A. I thought, **“Wow! This is bigger than me! What am I doing here?”** Yes, I was a bit anxious about taking on such a task. **I spent a lot of time putting services together ...** our kitchen was my office. But I probably got more out of it than anybody... more spirituality.
- Q. What would you say are the highlights of your 16 wonderful years of leadership?
- A. There are lots of highs: Most important was the purchase of our first Torah. Going to New York and bringing back this historic symbol of our faith was overwhelming. Of course there was the actual building of Temple Shalom, the beginnings of the choir, the expansion of outreach and interfaith services, the opportunity to represent the Jewish Community as its religious leader. And the greatest highlight was – and is – the friendships we have formed.
- Q. If you could look into a crystal ball, what would you see?
- A. I see lots of expansion, more building, 1000 person membership, more Judaism in the area.
- Q. You said that you have spoken with Rabbi Glazer, who will be leading Temple Shalom into the future. Can you share some of what you spoke of?
- A. I told him that the congregation expects change, and be patient... **don’t change too** much too fast. Enjoy the congregation and the Temple, as I did. We all welcome the Rabbi and his wife and wish them all the best.
- Q. And now for a well-earned **retirement.** **What’s on your agenda?**
- A. For so many years, our time was devoted to Temple Shalom. I had a job and did it the best I knew how. Now Eveleen and I are planning on spending our time with friends and family, the grandkids, and just being a congregant. Of course we hope to play more golf! We are ready to enjoy our later years!!

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
