Through Iris' Eyes

As you all know, when I ran for President one of my goals was to repair, clean and kosher all three Torahs. This important and obvious need was brought to my attention by Past President, Skip Honigstein. I was also approached by Danny and Carol Greenberg. We all happened to witness the main Torah tear on a seam during Shabbat Services last year. We all had been on the Bimah and at services often enough to see the Torahs show their age. Sheldon was one of the founders who chose the Torahs and can attest that they are very old but have certainly held up very well. After all, we handle them with tender loving care at Temple Shalom. But like many of us, when you reach a certain age, you need a lift!

Ralph Coster, past president of Brotherhood, encouraged the guys to **make "The Guardians** of the Torah" an official Brotherhood project. Ralph spent many hours researching and organizing the first sofer on site. The scribe was present to demonstrate the actual work required to rewrite some of the faded letters and words.

Ann Jasper got involved after our beloved Marvin passed away and the official name became the "Marvin Jasper Guardian of the Torah Fund." Many members donated and the project for repairing, cleaning and koshering one Torah was well on its way.

This past January, Paul Elias became Brotherhood President. He picked up where Ralph left off and lucky for Temple Shalom, an anonymous donor contributed the money necessary to complete the job which includes all three Torahs. Thank you from all of us!

Paul arranged for with the Sofer on site and the Scribe and Rabbi Salazar was at Temple

Shalom on Wednesday, April 26. I was one of the fortunate donors who met the **Rabbi and held his hand while "we" wrote** the word "neetzvu." I need to thank Sara Branscome and Rabbi Glazer for assisting me in locating the word in the Torah and understanding its meaning. Rabbi Salazar was certainly a patient and informative teacher, as well as a scribe, but my memory needed assistance.

My "word" is in the The Song of the Sea, (Shirat HaYam, also known as AzYashir Moshe) a poem that appears in Exodus 15:1–



Rabbi Glazer tells me that "neetzvu" means "stood strong;" as the Israelites stood strong. A good word to write, in my humble opinion.

The poem forms part of parshat Beshalach. It is one of only two sections of the Sefer Torah that is written with a different layout from the normal simple columns. We recite part of the poem

at most of our services when we say: "Who among the gods is like you, Lord? Who is like you majestic in holiness, awesome in glory, working wonders?"

I'm obviously kvelling over this entire experience. It was a glorious moment sitting there with the Torah and the scribe. It brought me back to the Orthodox Synagogue, where my Bubbe Bashka took me to help clean the kitchen, while my Zaide prayed and read Torah daily. Women and girls were not allowed near the Ark. My Bubbe is kvelling now from Heaven. To know that her maidala actually held the hand of the sofer and not only was up close and personal, but had the opportunity to assist in writing on the scroll. An amazing day at Temple Shalom. My friend Elaine Morris felt the very same sense of wonder. As young Orthodox girls, who knew this would have been possible?

Brotherhood: Let us Remember The Six Day War

June 5th marks the 50th anniversary of the Six Day War. Here are some accounts of events leading up to the war:

In the spring of 1967, following close to a decade of relative calm, Israel found itself poised for war against four of its Arab neighbors.

According to all the military analysts and pundits, it was to be a lopsided match. The Israel Defense Forces consisted of 275,000 troops, compared to the 456,000 soldiers of the combined Iraqi, Syrian, Jordanian and Egyptian armies. The united Arab forces also had a decided edge with regards to weaponry and military equipment: they boasted more than double the amount of tanks, and close to four times the amount of combat aircraft. The three-week period preceding the Six Day War was one of dread, shock and fright for the residents of the Holy Land.

With close to 2.5 million Jews living in the tiny country, it had the highest concentration of Jews since pre-Holocaust Eastern Europe. So pessimistic was the outlook that the nation's cemeteries and national parks were marked to become grave sites for the many who would surely perish in the course of the war.

Despite all the prognostications, by the time the war ended the territory under Israel's control had tripled in size. Jews returned to sites where their ancestors had lived for thousands of years, sites from which waves of terror had been launched against them for so many years. The casualties and losses were painful, but minimal in comparison to all projections. The Jewish nation was miraculously victorious in the face of unbelievable odds.

Jews across the globe thanked G-D for the great miracles that happened. An incredible sense of pride and spiritual awakening gripped the Jewish people worldwide.

Let's all take a moment to remember those who did what they had to do at a time of great need.

Ed-Jew-Cation: IF I WERE A RICH MAN

"If I were a rich man, daidle deedle daidle daidle deedle daedle dum", so intones Tevya in ""Fiddler on the Roof." Let's suppose he were a rich man.... would that change him as a father, husband, man, philanthropist, or Jew? Hard to say. We should ask someone who would know... a rich man-- like, for instance, Larry Ellison, the CEO of Oracle (database technology).



Mr. Ellison, age 72, was listed by *Forbes* Magazine in March '17, as the 5th wealthiest person in America, and the 7th richest in the world, with a worth of \$55 billion! Larry is the son of an unwed Jewish mother and an Italian USAF pilot. His mother gave him up for adoption to her aunt and uncle, who raised him Jewish. He said he couldn't believe in the Jewish principles and thus remains a religious skeptic. His main attachment to Israel is for the innovative spirit of the Israelis and their technology savvy. He has been married and divorced 4 times (so much for good husband) and is the father of two children who are producers for one of his companies. He gave \$10 million to Friends of Israel Defense Forces because, "In my mind there is no greater honor than supporting some of the bravest people in the world. These men and women come together with indefatigable purpose, to defend Israel and strive to co-exist in peace." Has money changed him? Of course. For the better????????

Or we could ask Mark Zuckerberg, a founder *of Facebook*. Here is a young (32 years old) Jewish man, married to Priscilla Chan, and the father of a baby girl and another one on the way. How about him? He certainly is rich ... his net worth in March '17 was valued at \$58.6 billion, the 5th richest person in the world. He was raised in a Jewish home, a Bar Mitzvah boy, but later identified himself as an atheist. Then in 2016 he said, "I was raised Jewish and then I went through a period where I questioned things, but now I believe religion is very important." His name tops the annual list of the 50 most generous Americans, giving \$1 billion to charitable causes, with a promise to eventually give 99% of *Facebook* shares to the Chan Zuckerberg Initiative. Has money changed him? Probably yes. For the better? He seems to be on the right track.

If you want to know if being a rich man makes for a bigger philanthropist, the person to ask is Michael Bloomberg. Raised in Massachusetts in a Jewish family, he must have learned well the ideals of being charitable. It is estimated that Mr. Bloomberg has recently donated over \$1 billion to more than 850 charities. In 2013 he was chosen as Laureate of Genesis prizewinner -- \$1 million dollars presented annually for the person with the highest Jewish values. He invested it in the Genesis Generation Challenge – to help young adults with big ideas to make the world a better place. Michael, mayor of NYC for three terms and CEO of Bloomberg L.P. Global Financial Services, etc., is listed as 10^{th} richest man in the world with a worth of \$47.5 billion. But is he a good Jew? Well, he makes it to High Holy Day services and a family Seder, although his ex-wife and present significant other are not of the faith and his daughters are not practicing Jews. He does visit Israel frequently and is committed to investing in projects to make the world free of bigotry. Has money changed him? Probably not ... he has always had it and now he just has more. But he certainly deserves credit for his charitable ways.

Maybe the best man to ask would be Sheldon Adelson, 83, head of Las Vegas Sands, the largest casino company in America, and owner of an Israeli newspaper. Coming from a poor Jewish family, as a child he slept on the floor of a Boston tenement. He started his career at age 12, when he borrowed \$10 to start selling newspapers. He worked hard and smart to get where he is. With his former wife Sandra he raised three adopted children. His second marriage in 1991 was to Miriam Farstein Ochshorn, a brilliant Israeli medical scientist and doctor, daughter of Polish refugees. Since 2007 the Adelson Family Foundation has given \$140 million to Birthright Israel to encourage sons and daughters of at least one Jewish parent to visit the land of Israel. He also gave \$5+million to the Friends of Israel Defense Forces, and many millions to Yad Vashem. Forbes ranks him #20, with a net worth of \$33.5 billion. Has money changed him? Undoubtedly yes, and most likely for the better.

Well then, all you wonderful male members of the congregation, if you were a rich man, what would you do? Apparently you know that answer, because you are already doing it! You are living a beautiful life, honoring your loved ones – parents, spouses or companions, children – giving charity to those less fortunate, and supporting your religious home, Temple Shalom. You are a good man, Charlie Brownstein! HAPPY FATHER'S DAY TO YOU!

We all danced the Hora and sang Israeli songs.



A SALUTE TO THE FLAG

Flag Day, June 14th, commemorates the adoption of the American flag in 1777. The date, June 14th, was officially set by President Wilson in 1916, inspiring patriotism during the time of WWI. The American flag, has been used primarily as an identifying symbol displayed on things military--ships, camps, uniforms, territories, etc. By the declaration of a National Flag Day by Congress in 1949, the flag became more of a symbol of patriotism and national history.

Dr. Gary Zola, historian at Hebrew Union College, notes that Jews began placing the country's flag in synagogues even before that date ... around 1898 when the Spanish American war sparked patriotic fervor. He wrote that when Lincoln was assassinated, the American rabbis spoke of the need to unify the nation and congregations were encouraged to fly the flag in the synagogue. After WWI, returning Jewish veterans were feeling very patriotic and by 1930 the US flag displayed on the Bimah was an established tradition. However, flying the American flag on the Bimah became a political issue in many synagogues. Jonathan Sarna, professor at Brandeis University, said that many houses of worship neglected or removed this national symbol doing the Vietnam conflict but brought it back after 9/11-another era of extreme nationalism. The Zionist flag later came to represent the State of Israel after its founding and began appearing in the 1890's, mostly in Conservative buildings. Reform congregation leaders were reluctant about Zionism until the advent of the Holocaust and therefore would not display that flag. In 1954 the Central Conference of American Rabbis declared that the Israeli flag was quite out of place in American synagogues, but that group rescinded its objection by 1977, when Reform Judaism embraced the State of Israel.

The Christian community, especially the Catholic Church, was quite adamant about not displaying the **American flag in their sanctuaries...** the reason being their belief that God is supreme, not the state, and thus should not be honored or knelt before in the chapel. The lobby of a building was considered the proper place for the flag.

Dr. Zola conjectures that minority groups like the Jews were more likely to have the flag inside the area of worship as to do so demonstrated their loyalty as American citizens. He concludes that having both American and Israeli flags inside the sanctuary is common practice today.

Whatever the religious persuasion, Americans are proud of their flag and honor Flag Day. THREE CHEERS FOR THE RED, WHITE, AND BLUE!!

In the last Shalom, you had asked to send you info if we had had other Jewish experiences in synagogues. My husband and I visited a Temple in Budapest. It was not only quite large and beautiful, but we were told it was the second largest in the world.

I asked what the first was, and told it was Temple Emanuel in New York City. Amazing to us because we grew up in Brooklyn and never went to Temple Emanuel. You can be sure, the next time we were in New York, we visited Temple Emanuel and were delighted with what we saw. Not only was it huge, but exquisite. The walls and poles were covered with detailed colorful carvings and pictures. It was a treat, and made us feel so proud.

The House that Jack Built by Ery Margulis, Trustee

In 1993 several couples in The Villages got together to form a club. They decided to call it the Jewish Friends Club. What made it so unique was that one of the members was not Jewish. His name was Jack Vitale. Jack was married to Sharna, who was Jewish, and Jack felt a deep connection to the Jewish people.

The club was open to anyone who wanted to join. They first met at Paradise Recreation Center in The Villages, and as they grew in membership they moved to the La Hacienda Recreation Center. The club was very informal and was run by volunteers. During their meetings they discussed current events, traveling possibilities, and any other subjects of interest to the club. This was followed by lunch, local entertainment and card games. At its height they averaged 135 people in attendance and a membership of 700 people. After seven years, the person running the meetings had to retire, and the membership decided to elect a president and board of directors. Much to our surprise, for the first time, they elected Jack Vitale, a non-Jew to become their first president of a supposedly Jewish organization.

During one of the meetings, Jack asked if anyone was interested in forming a Jewish congregation. Twenty-five people responded, and the New Jewish Congregation was born. Jack formed committees, created a newsletter and did everything necessary to run an organization. Since Jack had no time to run the Jewish Friends Club, he asked me, Erv Margulis, to take over, and I became its second President. Since we didn't have many congregants, Jack, Saul Truskin and I were part of most of the committees. Eventually, we decided it was time to elect officers and trustees. To no one's surprise, Jack, a non-Jew, was voted first president of the New Jewish Congregation.

Our first meeting was held at the Oxford Community Center, with 47 members in attendance. Since we had no Torah, Sy Rosenblatt Ioaned us his miniature Torah. We finally raised enough money to send Eli Cohen and Sheldon Skurow to New York to purchase our first Torah for \$12,000. We rapidly outgrew the center and moved to Lady Lake Methodist Church, and then to Oxford Methodist Church. As the High Holidays approached, we realized the church wasn't big enough to hold our 225 membership. We approached newly built St. George's Episcopal Church, and asked if we could use their facilities. They agreed and we experienced an unforgettable holiday. Sheldon conducted an inspirational service, the choir sang with great enthusiasm, and the entire audience felt a special bonding they had never felt before. After the High Holidays, my wife and I were chosen to return to the Church and compensate them for the use of their facilities. The pastor said he could not ask us for any money because we were G-d's chosen people and he had to help us in our hour of need. Needless to say we were stunned. It was agreed that we would make a charitable donation in the church's name. Jack said to me that it was time for us Jews to stop wandering and build a temple.

I had concerns about raising enough money to break ground, but Jack said, "I promise you that

by the time we build this temple, we will have grown to 400 members, and by the end of the first year we will have reached 500 members." That statement must have gone directly to G-d's ears because that is exactly what happened.

Ernie Neff formed the facilities committee to design and direct the building, Butch Ballot purchased the land, and Mark Greenwald helped raise \$1,000,000 for groundbreaking. As the builders were framing the Temple, we received terrible news. Jack was diagnosed with incurable cancer and would not live long enough to see the Temple's completion. To honor Jack one last time, they brought him to the temple in his wheelchair, placed the Torah on his lap, and wheeled him through the door frame so that he would be the first to enter the "House that Jack Built".

Upon completion we had our Kadima Walk. With lots of fanfare, police escorts and horseback riders, we started at Oxford Methodist Church where our Torah was housed. Two members were given the Torah to carry about 100 yards each in the direction of the Temple. They handed off the Torah to another waiting couple who in turn did the same until the three-mile walk to the new Temple was completed.

High up in this sanctuary there is a large Star of David that was donated by Sharna and Jack Vitale. Every day the sun shines it brings a beautiful rainbow of colors into this sanctuary, and we know that Jack is watching over us.

Thank you Jack, Rest in Peace.




