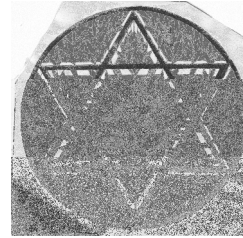

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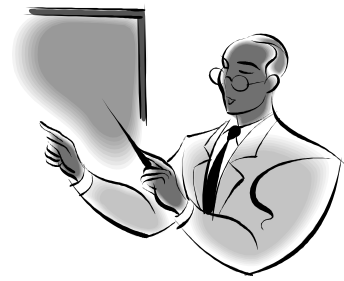

Kisses and Knishes

Our congregation has grown over the years and now has reached the age of 13. And like any 13 year-old Jewish child, our congregation is going to celebrate its bar mitzvah. On January 31, 2015, we will have a gala celebration with music and speeches and the sharing of memories. And like any Jewish function, there will be much food to eat, starting with potato pancakes and continuing through the main course of beef and turkey, and ending with a wonderful dessert. It will be a celebration to be talked about for many years to come.

It may be time to look back at our food traditions to see just how far we have come. In 1995, there was the Jewish Friends Club that met in a small room at the Paradise Recreation Center. There were few Jewish people in the area, and the club welcomed participation from people from as far away as Leesburg. There was a generosity among us; at each meeting there would be platters of homemade cookies and cakes. If we were celebrating (and we found many reasons to celebrate), there would be huge quantities of savory dishes - potato pancakes, knishes, chicken, brisket - enough to feed an army. Mind you now, there were only about 25 of us then. But the club grew, and soon we needed a larger meeting room, and the club moved to La Hacienda Center. As membership increased, much of the warmth and hominess of the original group was lost. The good news was that there was more talk of there being enough of a Jewish population that it might be possible to start a congregation.

Using the Jewish Friends Club membership list, Jack Vitale sent an invitation to all asking if there was interest in forming a congregation. And so we met 13 years ago, and at La Hacienda Center, the New Jewish Congregation was born. Dues were set at \$25 per year.

Our first worship services were held at the Oxford Community Center. At our first Oneg Shabbat, Jack and Sharna Vitale donated a beautiful cake. (A political note here, showing the importance of having a visible Jewish presence in this area: When ordering the cake, Jack and Sharna were told that there would be a fee for putting a Star of David on the cake. Such an attitude would be unthinkable today.)

Our first Yom Hashoah service was on the shore of Lake Mira Mar, where we lit candles, and remembered, and prayed.

Let's get back to the food. Our first Seder was held at the Oxford Community Center. The meal was prepared by some of the ladies of the congregation. Using the woefully inadequate facilities of the Oxford Community Center, we were served a feast, which included all the traditional foods and chicken and sweet potatoes.

A storefront church let us use their space for our first High Holy Day services. It was just after 9/11, and in that sad and frightening time, we had the comfort of worshiping together in a truly meaningful way. It was at that storefront church that we held our first Break Fast - bagels and cream cheese and lox and danish were served by the ladies of our congregation.

From those humble beginnings, we are celebrating our bar mitzvah in the way we do so well, with warmth and friendship, and lots of food.

ED-JEW-CATION:

Your *bubbe* would say that it is a *shande* for a Jew to be a *shicker* (drunkard). There is even a scientific belief (unproven) that there is a genetic biochemical basis for Jewish abstinence ... that approximately 50% of Jews carry a variant gene for alcohol dehydrogenase... meaning that they have a low tolerance for alcohol. Why, then, is there a strong connection between Jews and booze? Last month's article talked about Jews and wine. Now let's sit down, have a drink, and talk about Jews and distilled liquor.

In ancient Babylon, under Persian rule, Jews were prominent in brewing, distilling, and selling alcoholic beverages. Since the 15th century in Central Europe, Jews were involved with the liquor trade, being among the few occupations in which the Jews were free to indulge. In the 19th century, 85% of registered Polish taverns, owned by the nobles, were leased by Jews. The Jewish-run tavern was frequently the center of leisure, hospitality, business, and sometimes, religious festivities. This came about because the nobles who owned the taverns believed that only the Jew was sober enough not to drink up the profits. Although these Jewish tavern keepers were integral to the economic and social life of the community, there were those gentile reformers and government officials who blamed the Jewish tavern keepers for peasant drunkenness and tried to drive them out of the liquor trade. However, many nobles helped their Jewish employees/agents evade fees, bans, and expulsions by installing Christians as fronts for their taverns. Despite this clandestine assistance, by 1892, liquor became a government monopoly, and 200,000 Jews lost their livelihood.

When Jewish immigrants arrived in America in the 19th century, business opportunities in the liquor trade (starting with kosher wine) represented "a powerful link between their past and their present." Their success in business opened the way for Jewish participation in American politics and culture. But then along came Prohibition! Of course the Jewish presence in the liquor trade brought out all kinds of critical attention, associating the Jews with vice, crime, race-mixing, etc. The slandering and anti-semitism was exacerbated by the fact that Prohibition brought Jews into the underground economy of bootlegging. Jewish mobsters, like Meyer Lansky and

Moe Dalitz, not only exploited the gentile world, but also regularly hit on Jewish merchants through extortion. The Canadian, Sam Bronfman (did you know that *bronfn* means liquor in Yiddish?) became the leader of a huge smuggling empire along the Canadian/US border. He bought up Joseph Seagram's distillery and took on the company name. It was said that Bronfman ferried so much liquor across the border so successfully that Lake Erie became known locally as the "Jewish Lake." Interestingly, Section 6 of the Volstead Act allowed Jewish families 10 gallons of kosher wine a year for religious use, which left a huge loophole in the law. In 1924, the Bureau of Prohibition distributed 2,944,764 gallons of wine to Jewish religious organizations, and the American Jew marveled at the "rapid growth of Judaism." Humorously, a Jewish prohibition agent arrested, not only actual rabbis for dispensing "sacramental" liquors as well as kosher wine, but also rabbis "of convenience," named Houlihan and Maguire, and Afro-Americans who claimed to have recently "got religion in the Hebraic persuasion." Henry Ford, an outspoken anti-semite, claimed in his newspaper, the *Dearborn Independent*, that Jewish transgressions against Prohibition represented widespread conspiracy against American morals." This could be construed as partially true, as it is estimated that at least 50% of the known bootleggers were Eastern European Jews.

With the repeal of Prohibition, Jews re-entered the now legalized liquor business, and Bronfman and Lewis Rosensteil of Schenley Distillers became even more successful. Because of the damage done to the reputation of the Jewish community by their former activities, these leaders of the liquor industry made amends by becoming huge philanthropists, especially generous to Jewish organizations. That generosity exists even today. Personally, having had a grandfather in the wine and liquor business (before Prohibition) and an uncle who was a bootlegger (during Prohibition), I can relate to the connection between Jews and Booze. And I'll bet that most of Temple Shalom congregants can find examples of it in their genealogy, too. So to all of you, *L'Chaim*! Let's appoint a "designated driver" and drink to a Happy, Healthy New Year for us and our families!

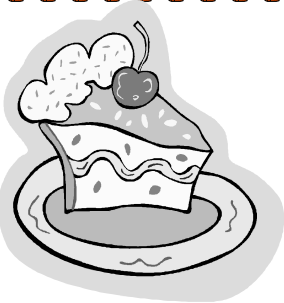

Continuing with the conquests of Joshua –

Having captured Ai, and the people of Gibeon having surrendered to Joshua, King Adon-Zedek of Jerusalem, having learned of the conquest, was fearful that Gibeon would attack his city.

Because of that fear, he sent a message to four other neighboring kings and urged them to attack Gibeon because it had come to terms with Joshua and the Israelites.

The armies of the five kings marched on Gibeon and attacked, whereupon the people of Gibeon sent a message to Joshua asking for help. Joshua then marched to protect Gibeon with his trained warriors.

The Lord said to Joshua, "Do not be afraid of them, for I will deliver them into your hands; not one of them shall withstand you." (Joshua 10:8 and 9)

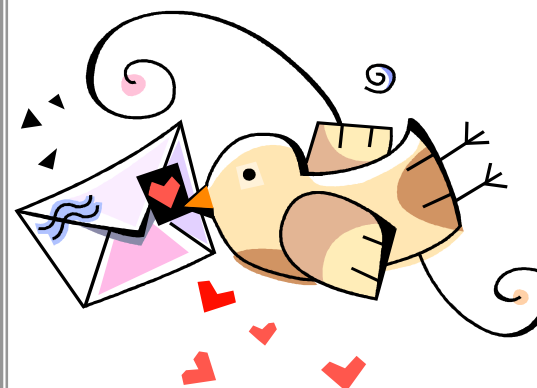
